What You Can Do!

- Participate in community cleanups.
- Place litter in trash receptacles so that the waste does not end up in roads, storm drains, or waterways.
- Keep fertilizers off paved surfaces such as driveways, sidewalks and roads. Sweep excess fertilizer up onto the lawn.
- Keep grass and leaves out of roads and storm drains.
- Use grass and leave clippings as a resource for compost.
- Clean up pet waste. Dispose of waste in the trash or in a pet waste container.
- Contact local government agencies for locations of hazardous waste disposal facilities.
- Maintain your car and fix any oil, transmission, or radiator leaks as soon as possible.
