Watershed Meeting for Flood Impacted Areas

Double Hammock Watershed Meeting

September 10, 2015 – County Board Room, Pasco County

The following is a summary of the Double Hammock Watershed meeting held on September 10, 2015. A copy of the PowerPoint presentation will accompany this summary.

Arrival, Sign-In, Greetings, and Introductions

Ms. Michele Baker (Pasco County Administrator) welcomed the group. Ms. Baker noted that additional information was available and maps were on display at the sign-in table. Commissioners Mike Wells (District 4) and Jack Mariano (District 5) addressed attendees to convey their concerns for the residents and that residential input was vital to the team effort and working toward finding solutions. Ms. Baker noted that Commissioner Kathryn Starkey (District 3) was out of town but also wanted to relay her regards and concerns to the residents. Ms. Baker noted that key members of County staff would be speaking as part of the PowerPoint presentation provided during the meeting.

Comments, Questions and Discussions

A summary of discussions, including questions and responses, are provided in this meeting summary. The contents of this summary do not represent direct quotes and may or may not represent the group's view as a whole.

PowerPoint Presentation and General Discussion

A PowerPoint presentation (see attachment) was presented to attendees.

Ms. Cindy Jolly (Stormwater Management) provided an overview of the Double Hammock Watershed which covers approximately 13 square miles and includes highly developed and urbanized areas. The 100-year storm event represents a 12.4 inch rainfall event occurring within a 24-hour period and is the standard utilized during flood map development. Ms. Jolly presented the recorded rainfall amounts during the storm event, reviewed stormwater requirements for new developments, and explained what happens to rainfall during normal conditions versus what happens during saturated conditions.

In 1981, Pasco County adopted Flood Insurance Rate maps. Permits for new developments after the adoption of the maps included criteria for stormwater systems associated with new developments. Construction prior to 1981 did not include the same stormwater system requirements.

The Double Hammock watershed is a topographically flat and includes closed basins. It was noted that the Timber Oaks area is a closed basin and a drainage basin of special concern. Stormwater generally flows through the basin from the east into Double

Hammock Creek and eventually makes its way to the Gulf of Mexico. Some flows also come from the north. Areas that were identified as impacted within the Double Hammock watershed included Timber Oaks which required pumping, and Jasmine Lakes where failed culverts were noted.

Mr. Mike Garrett (Stormwater Management) provided an overview of the pumping efforts associated with the recent flooding event. The County was managing approximately 30 pumping systems and was moving the pumps around various locations throughout the flooding response. As Timber Oaks is a closed basin, pumps were set-up to pump stormwater to the north into Dollar Lake. Additional pumps were deployed in this area to pump to the retention areas to the west of Timber Oaks and also over to Ranch Road. A series of four pumps were also in use in the Jasmine Lakes area. These pumps moved water from Amadeus Drive, to Mimosa Drive, to Gardenia Lane, allowed a bypass of the failed culvert on Pineapple Lane, and sent flows out to the Gulf of Mexico via the discharge under US Highway 19.

There is a Watershed Management Plan in progress that includes the Double Hammock watershed, which is a cooperative project with the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD). It is anticipated that the updated watershed model will be completed by early 2017. The updated stormwater model will help to predict the stormwater flow path and how projects will impact those flows to help reduce flooding. In order to proceed with construction of new projects, the County has to demonstrate that there are no anticipated adverse stormwater impacts prior to getting permit approval. This area has hundreds of miles of old corrugated pipes with many having failed. There are currently eleven pipe replacement projects under construction with more ready to be released for bid soon. The County is also completing some of the smaller projects in-house. As soon as the culverts are dried out within Jasmine Lakes, the County can proceed with using pipe cameras for inspections.

Ms. Annette Doying (Emergency Management) provided an overview of the emergency response to date which began on July 16th. The County provides emergency services for all of Pasco County including the areas within the various cities. Information presented included actions to protect public safety, evacuated areas, damage assessments, human needs assessments, temporary housing assistance, and the continued services available to impacted residents.

The emergency response was a team effort and included assistance from the Salvation Army, Red Cross, Fire Chiefs' Association, Forestry Service, and many other agencies. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) decided to not declare Pasco County as a national disaster area and therefore FEMA assistance is not currently available. Governor Scott has decided to appeal this decision and additional documentation is being prepared for this effort.

Mr. George Romagnoli (Human Resources) provided an overview of the continued Flood Recovery Center operations and reviewed the assistance programs that are available to impacted residents. To date over 70 hotel vouchers have been issued providing

temporary housing for approximately 225 residents. It was noted that hotel vouchers are still available through October 5th and residents in need of assistance were encouraged to contact the County's Flood Recovery Center. Assistance for renter relocations are also available.

The County was awarded \$1.5 million dollars of State funding to supplement the State Housing Initiative Partnership efforts. Top priorities for these funds will be to assist with owner occupied housing rehabilitation and relocation assistance. The County has received over 100 applications to date and is working to expedite reviews.

Comment Card Discussions

Prior to and throughout the meeting, attendees were asked to fill out comment cards to convey questions or concerns. The comment cards were collected throughout the meeting and were grouped by topic. Ms. Baker provided initial responses, based on the grouped topics noted below, to attendees. Comment cards will be distributed to the appropriate County department for additional review and follow-up.

Pumping– The County was pumping stormwater out of Timber Oaks and is working with the SWFWMD to implement a long-term solution. There was no pumping into the area by the County and County was not aware of anyone else pumping into this area.

Stormwater Assessment – The County has a stormwater assessment which appears on the property owners' TRIM notice and is paid as part of the property taxes. There has been a public hearing and an approval to increase the current \$47 annual fee by \$10 to \$57 per year. The fee is used to pay for County stormwater maintenance activities, NPDES compliance, program maintenance, stormwater modeling, and studies to develop best management practices (BMPs). It does not currently fund capital improvement projects and is not associated with other utility services such as wastewater.

Sinkhole Repairs– A resident noted concrete had appeared in a retention pond in the Ironbark area. The County confirmed there have been numerous sinkhole repairs within this area completed by homeowners. A map showing the sink holes repair locations was shared with attendees during the meeting. This map is available to the public on the County's website through the Geographic Information Services with a mapping program known as PascoView. Filling of sinkholes does create changed underground conditions.

Stormwater System Maintenance – There are numerous stormwater systems throughout the County that are privately owned and were built as a part of a new development. The County's maintenance team does not maintain private stormwater systems. Maintenance for private systems is the responsibility of the Homeowner Associations (HOAs) or Community Development Districts (CDDs) that were created by the developer. In some cases, the private properties boundaries extend into the stormwater ponds such that each property owner actually owns part of the stormwater pond. The owning entity is responsible for completing required maintenance activities. It is important to keep culverts clear to allow stormwater to flow freely.

Stormwater Projects – There were numerous comments regarding the status of various stormwater projects. The County is studying multiple potential solutions including diverting flows before they reach flood prone areas and installation of new stormwater pipes. The County noted that it is not always able to obtain the easements required to complete proposed projects. There are several studies in progress for this watershed and County is looking at long-term potential solutions. FGUA will be replacing the failed culverts on Pineapple Lane. There was also a comment card asking about potential flooding contributions due to the construction at US19. The work on US19 is maintenance activity by the FDOT and County did not find any blockages resulting from these activities.

Public Safety – Residents would like the County to deter the truck traffic that was coming into their neighborhoods to look at the flooding and noted that some children were seen swimming in the stormwater ponds. County did deploy barricades but these are often removed and at times disappear. The County urged parents to encourage children to stay out of any flood waters and out of the stormwater ponds.

Road Repairs –The County’s road repair program for collector and arterial roadways is funded by the County’s gas tax. Residential major road repairs are funded through the Paving Assessment (PVAS) program where the benefitted property owners are responsible for payment. New developments are responsible for the payment of a Transportation Mobility Fee. County staff did fill potholes with millings to allow for emergency vehicle accessibility and there will be extensive roadway repairs needed as a result of the flooding. Residents may elect to become part of the PVAS program. A Board of County Commissioners Workshop is scheduled for October 13th which will include discussions for how to deal with the needed road repairs.

Podium Speaker Discussions

Attendees were provided an opportunity to come to the podium to present their individual concerns. The following is a summary of concerns presented. County provided initial responses during the meeting where applicable and will follow-up to address concerns after the meeting.

Speaker 1. Timber Oaks resident -

Speaker provided a summary of flooding and rainfall totals noted within Timber Oaks. He thanked the County for being very responsive and for taking the time to listen to residents. *See typed summary provided by this resident at the end of this meeting summary.*

Speaker 2. Palm Terrace Gardens resident –

The County promised an engineering solution for our flooding problems last year and we still do not have a resolution. Problem areas included the stormwater retention ponds between Ironbark Drive and Hawthorn Drive and between Greybirch Terrace and Foxbloom Drive. There are now 3-4 vacant homes on Ironbark Drive. The stormwater runs into our neighborhood from the west not the east as previously stated.

Initial Response: The County will review the prior report and will follow-up.

Speaker 3. Hibiscus Drive resident –

There is construction at the culvert and stormwater is flowing over Bougainvillea Avenue. Oleander Drive goes under water immediately. The County needs to dredge the ditch by Bougainvillea Avenue to stop the water from flowing onto the street. The water coming in from the west, is likely due to tidal rises.

Initial Response: The County will review this area and will follow-up.

Speaker 4. Ledgestone Lane resident –

Resident thanked the County for the hazard response. He is not in favor of the stormwater assessment increase. Flooding has been an issue for a long time in this area and would like someone to provide a solution. If there is an increase in the fee, resident would like to see more notable improvements.

Speaker 5. Timber Oaks resident –

Stormwater is flowing into Timber Oaks from Golden Acres by flowing under Jasmine Boulevard. The resident ask if someone was pumping water into Timber Oaks and noted that there was pumping activity at night.

Initial Response: County was not pumping water into Timber Oaks and was not aware of any pumping activities. County will investigate the reported unapproved pumping activity.

Speaker 6. Hickory Hills resident -

Resident referenced the FGUA meetings, the bridge replacement and the storm drains that are in need of repair. His home is flooded and the area needs to be dredged to restore stormwater flows. The roads are flooded and pipes are silted in. Dredging would make a big difference. Resident has had flooding complaints since 2009 which are still not resolved.

Initial Response: A representative from FGUA is in attendance listening to these discussions and the FGUA projects are in progress.

Speaker 7. Crystal Lake Drive resident –

Crystal Lake is full. Pumping trucks have been coming in to but you can't pump out an entire lake. If the stormwater assessment is increasing, we want to see results. The road repairs are not well managed, sidewalks construction is poor, projects are not coordinated, and there is a street sign located in the middle of our sidewalk. The County needs to manage projects more efficiently.

Speaker 8. Adare Drive resident –

Has the County thought about stormwater reuse or using stormwater for aquifer recharge? The pumping at the school is getting pumped into our neighborhood.

Initial Response: The County is looking at several projects that include beneficially reusing stormwater. The school is located within the city of New Port Richey and the County will follow-up with the city regarding pumping activities.

All speakers were thanked for their comments and the meeting was adjourned at 7:15pm. The County will be following up on comments received during the meeting via the comment cards and by the speakers.

FLOODING SUMMARY FOR TIMBER OAKS

August 21, 2015

Timber Oaks is located in a closed basin and was designated a basin of special concern, where most of the street drains were designed to primary drain onto the golf course and Footprint Lake.

Between 1988 and 2015 we had storms that resulted in flooding: 1988, 1993, 1995, 1998, 2004, 2012 and 2015. Historically the Golf Course flooded many times which resulted in a number of road closings and homes being threatened.

In 2015 from July 21st to Aug. 3rd Timber Oaks received 22.8 inches of rain. Flooding the golf course and raising Footprint Lake 61 inches while pumping. This resulted in flooding, many of our roads and a number of houses where a least two had to have 4ft of dry wall removed, lost all their furniture, appliances and most of their personnel belongings. We had to close our clubhouse and pool area and a parking lot for an extended period of time because of high water.

It's now 22 days later we still have one of our streets closed, a number of houses in that area with water in their driveways and yards, the mailman unable to deliver mail to their mailboxes. Our maintenance bldg. has limited accessibility due to high water at the entrance.

One of the problems with this area is water coming from outside of Timber Oaks onto the back of the golf course from the other side of Jasmin Blvd. the other source is believed to be Golden acres from a manhole on little Rd and a pipe running between Timber Oaks and Walgreens dumping water in Timber Oaks which contributes to the flooding at Benton and Winding Wood. In 2012 when this happened, it took us 54 days of double pumping to get the water out of this area.

If the proposed Pasco County/Timber oaks storm water project had been approved and completed by now, I believe the flooding in Timber Oaks would have been significantly less and it would have been doubtful if any of our roads and homes would have flooded.



Pasco County is located on the west coast of Central Florida north of Tampa Bay. Four primary streams flow through Pasco County, including the Hillsborough River, the Withlacoochee River, the Anclote River and the Pithlachascotee River. There are 19 watersheds within Pasco County.

Pasco County and the Southwest Florida Water Management District cooperatively participate in a Watershed Management Program. The Watershed Management Program has five elements:

Topographic Information. The surface features and the boundaries of each watershed are determined.

Watershed Evaluation. The drainage flow and storage capabilities of the watershed are determined.

Watershed Management Plan. The plan will determine the capacity of a watershed to provide flood protection.

Best Management Practices. If the information from the Watershed Management Plan indicates that the level of service of the watershed is below the desired level of service, Best Management Practices (Projects) will be suggested that can improve the level of service. This may include development of water management facilities, land acquisition, regulation and education.

Maintenance of Watershed Information. New growth and altering the land can cause watershed features to change so the information within the Watershed Management Plan must be updated.

The Watershed Management Plan is also used for the development of updated Flood Insurance Rate Maps. Information on the Floodplain Management Program and the Flood Insurance Rate Maps is available by selecting this [link](#).




SWFWMD Rainfall Distribution

July 16 to August 17, 2015










SWFWMD Rainfall Distribution


July 16 to August 17, 2015



Current Conditions-Saturated







July 16 to August 17, 2015






